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1 INTRODUCTION

Parks, Recreation and Open Space are important elements of all communities and reflect positively on the quality of life for residents. In recent years, a more holistic approach to recreational planning has been encouraged, stretching beyond the boundaries of traditional parks to include sidewalks, linear trails, greenways, town squares, plazas and other publicly and privately owned lands. A variety of indoor facilities also serve the recreational and social needs of the public. In addition to the human benefits of recreation and open space, there are also important environmental benefits; such as water resource protection, reduced vehicular traffic and plant and wildlife protection.

PLAN PURPOSE

The 2025 City of Holland Community Parks and Recreation Plan has been prepared as a guide for future decision making concerning recreational facilities and services. This Plan presents an evaluation of Holland's recreation opportunities and needs. It considers the existing facilities in and around the City, the anticipated demand for additional or improved facilities, and the means for providing those facilities over the upcoming five-year period.

The City of Holland regularly updates the Plan both to reflect the changed needs and goals of the community, and to meet the Michigan Department of Natural Resource's requirements for qualifying for Federal and State funding assistance. These funds are available for land acquisition and facility development and improvements to new and existing parklands. Eligibility under this 2024 Community Parks and Recreation Plan will be in effect for five years. It is recommended, however, that the Plan be reviewed and updated, as necessary, every year to reflect



the changing needs of the community. This will also help assure that the capital improvement schedule reflects the actual budget and grant funding schedule.

PLAN SCOPE

The scope of this plan includes the City’s active and passive recreation facilities, undeveloped open space and linear “green” corridors. Recreational programming is also an important consideration. The area of the plan is essentially limited to the City boundaries. However, consideration is also given to neighboring municipal facilities and regional facilities that influence use patterns. In terms of time, the Capital Improvement Schedule of this document covers development over the next five years. However, the Goals and Objectives developed to guide recreation planning may continue to be relevant for many more years to come.





2 COMMUNITY DESCRIPTION

Nestled in the heart of West Michigan, on the shores of Lake Michigan and Lake Macatawa is the City of Holland, Michigan. Holland is a thriving city with a diverse economy that includes manufacturing, agriculture, tourism, and higher education. The city also attracts thousands of visitors each year for its annual Tulip Time Festival, which celebrates the area's Dutch heritage and vibrant tulip fields every May, and will celebrate the festival's 95th anniversary this year.

Ottawa County was originally home to an Ottawa (or Odawa) tribe of Native Americans under Chief Joseph Wakazoo. From 1839 to 1849 they lived under the tutoring of Reverend George Smith, head of the Old Wing Mission. The Wakazoo tribe owned and farmed 1,360 acres surrounding the Mission, but they preferred to live at their camp on the south shore of Black Lake. The first white settlers arrived from the Netherlands in April 1847, led by Reverend Albertus C. VanRaalte. They settled in the Black Lake watershed (now the Macatawa watershed), a heavily forested area, where they found soil suitable for farming and access to Chicago and other markets via a harbor on Lake Michigan. By 1849, the Dutch Colony had grown to 3,000, and Chief Wakazoo and Reverend Smith decided to relocate the Mission to Northport in the Traverse Bay region, in hopes of preserving their way of life. The Dutch settlement remains firmly established in southern Ottawa and northern Allegan Counties, the two leading agricultural counties in the state today.¹

Before any recreation plan is adopted and enacted, it is first important to understand the needs of the community and its residents, what recreational opportunities already exist and what future projects and programs are relevant to the residents of the community. This is based on the age, ability, population, density and the availability of recreational in the surrounding communities. This input is a critical component for plan.

The foundation for the development of the Holland Parks and Recreation Plan was based on the following goals:

- *Involve the community in the process*
- *Take inventory and map existing recreational facilities*
- *Build a strong foundation of stakeholders in addressing the future recreational needs and priorities of the community*
- *Enable the City to be eligible for financial assistance based upon the Recreation Plan*
- *Facilitate inter-agency collaboration in establishing recreation goals, objectives, and actions*
- *Continue to support and implement improvements for barrier-free universal access to City area parks*
- *Create consistency with and expansion upon goals and objectives set forth in existing planning documents that deal with recreation*

The new Recreation Plan is intended to guide city officials on future recreational and parks projects within the City of Holland. Specifically, this plan is developed in accordance with the guidelines for Community Park, Recreation, Open Space and Greenway Plans published by the Michigan Department of Natural Resources (MDNR). A five-year, MDNR approved Recreation Plan is necessary for the government entities to pursue MDNR-administered grants. This plan is written for the City of Holland and it covers all aspects of park facilities and recreation within the community.



SOCIAL CHARACTERISTICS



POPULATION

The U.S. Census Bureau estimates the population of the City of Holland (V2022) at 34,006 down 1.1% from the April 2020 estimate base.

MEDIAN AGE

While the overall population is the most important consideration, there are other characteristics to consider when planning for a community’s recreation. The age distribution of a community influences the types of facilities and programs needed. Table 2-2 shows that the City’s median age is lower than the County and State average. This would indicate that the City of Holland has younger age base than the rest of the county. While 20% of the population is under 18yrs., the City should not ignore the other age groups since they still comprise a large proportion of the overall population.

AVERAGE HOUSEHOLD SIZE



The U.S. Census Bureau recorded 12,535 households in the City of Holland from 2017-2021 with an average of 2.42 person per household.

INCOME, POVERTY AND EMPLOYMENT

Year-round City of Holland households had a median income of \$63,853 in 2021. This is an 8.6% 1-year growth. 66.6% of the population over the age of 16 years was employed in the civilian labor force with a poverty level at 10.9%

PHYSICALLY CHALLENGED

The disability status of a population may be especially significant when considering recreational needs for a community. With 9.5% of the City population affected by some form of disability, these individuals may have difficulty participating in recreational programs, accessing facilities or even getting to designated public areas. Understanding the disability status of the City's population may assist decision-makers in determining adequate programs and appropriate locations for recreational activities. With the passage of the Americans with Disabilities Act of 1990 (ADA), all areas of public service and accommodation became subject to barrier-free requirements, including parks and recreation facilities and programs.



TRANSPORTATION NETWORK

The transportation system within the City of Holland has had a major impact on its development patterns. Local streets, major streets, and state trunk-lines make up a transportation network formed to provide an efficient method of moving goods, services, and people. The presence of U.S. 31 and I-196 allow Holland to be within commuting distance from the Grand Haven, Muskegon, and Grand Rapids metropolitan areas. U.S. 31 bisects the City, providing north/south access along the Lake Michigan shoreline and facilitating travel from Chicago to northern Michigan. The Macatawa Area Express (MAX) bus service provides public transportation within the City of Holland, Zeeland and southern Holland Township. In addition to regular routes, a reservation service is also available. The Helen and Louis Padnos Transportation facility on Lincoln Avenue serves as a passenger transportation facility for Amtrak trains, the Greyhound Bus Lines and the MAX Transportation System. Amtrak provides a daily passenger service from Chicago to Grand Rapids. In addition, CSX railroads in the City of Holland provide transportation opportunities for freight.

LAND USE

The proximity to water was a dominant factor in shaping the physical character of Holland. One of the earliest tasks completed by the settlers was to excavate a shipping channel connecting Lake Macatawa to Lake Michigan. Over the years, the function of the channel slowly changed from primarily commercial shipping to recreational boating. Today, Holland ranks high in the number of moorings for pleasure craft among port communities on the eastern shore of Lake Michigan. Unlike the logging operations and heavy industries which once lined the Lake Macatawa shoreline, the lake perimeter is now bordered with beautiful single-family homes, summer houses, parks, and some industrial development near the central portion of the City.



Development spread from the original downtown area, between 3rd and 9th Streets, outward to 12th Street due to the establishment of Hope College. Southward growth continued with subsequent City boundaries at 16th, 32nd, and 64th. Following annexation of land formerly in Fillmore Township, the southernmost boundary now lies south of I-196.

Suburban growth was facilitated by the movement of industry away from the port facilities and closer to highways and railroads, although a significant amount of industry remains along the waterfront area. This created opportunity for residential and recreational uses along the waterfront.

Land use between U.S. 31 and the shores of Lake Macatawa is primarily residential, with commercial corridors in the Downtown area, along U.S. 31, Washington Avenue and Chicago Drive. Residential land use also dominates the northeast corner of the City. Industrial land use is predominately located south of U.S. 31, with some areas remaining along the waterfront. Limited agricultural land remains in the south of the city and in other isolated units.



PHYSICAL CHARACTERISTICS & RESOURCE INVENTORY

Holland's gently sloping contours are the product of the last period of glaciation some 10 to 12 thousand years ago. A morainal ridge traverses the southern and eastern edges of the community, establishing the highest elevations in town. The majority of the community slopes and drains to the north, into Lake Macatawa or the main channel of the Macatawa River.

Lake Macatawa forms the City of Holland's northern border and is the City's primary natural resource. This inland lake is approximately 5-6 miles long and connects to Lake Michigan through a man-made shipping channel 150 feet wide and maintained at a navigable depth of 22 feet. Water levels in Lake Macatawa are comparable to those of Lake Michigan, fluctuating around the 580 foot level. Historical depths of 100 feet have been recorded, but the deepest charted areas today are just over 30 feet. This is the result of many years of sedimentation due to changes from forest to farmland, and increasing urban drainage. Only 7% of the lake area exceeds a natural depth of 21', thus necessitating annual maintenance dredging to keep the shipping channel open. More than half the lake is less than 12' deep, posing problems along many residential shorelines for the mooring of sailboats and other deep-draft pleasure boats.

The City and surrounding Townships are part of the Macatawa Area Coordinating Council (MACC), which promotes the use of Best Management Practices to minimize run-off and contribute to the improvement of water quality. Lake Macatawa water quality has been an issue for many years. Each year thousands of pounds of phosphorus are carried from the surrounding watershed into Lake Macatawa when it rains. The MACC oversees a comprehensive watershed project aimed at reducing the amount of phosphorus that enters Lake Macatawa by rain runoff.

The Macatawa estuary, with its extensive marshlands, has been identified as a nesting or feeding ground for coots, grebes, heron, gulls, ducks, blackbirds, sparrows, swallows, cowbirds, pheasants, and starling. The Michigan Department



of Natural Resources has identified pike, bluegill, bass, crappies, steelhead, perch, and other game fish in the Macatawa lake and river system.

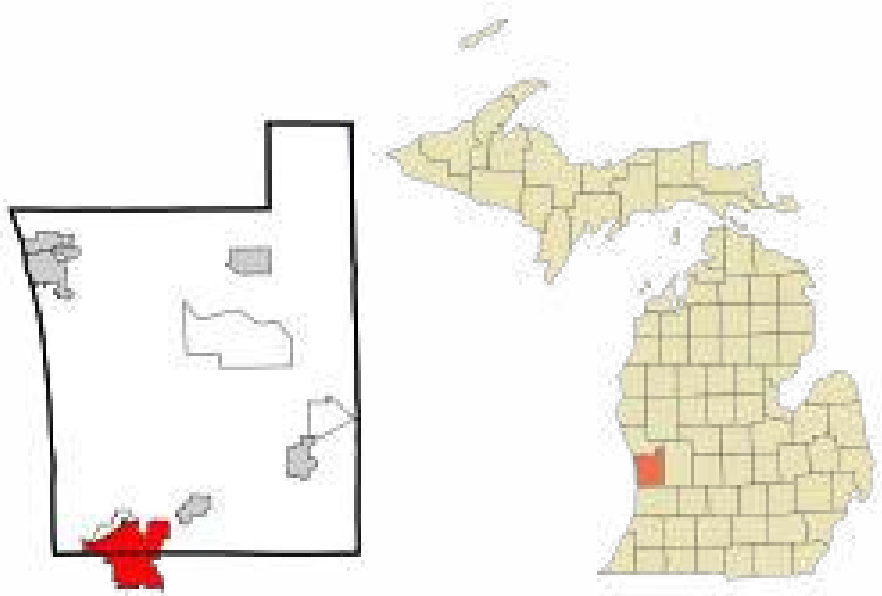
Another potentially vulnerable resource is the Lake Michigan dunes just west of Holland. Though outside of the corporate City, these dunes are a natural resource for the entire area, and the City shares an interest in their wise management and protection.

CLIMATE

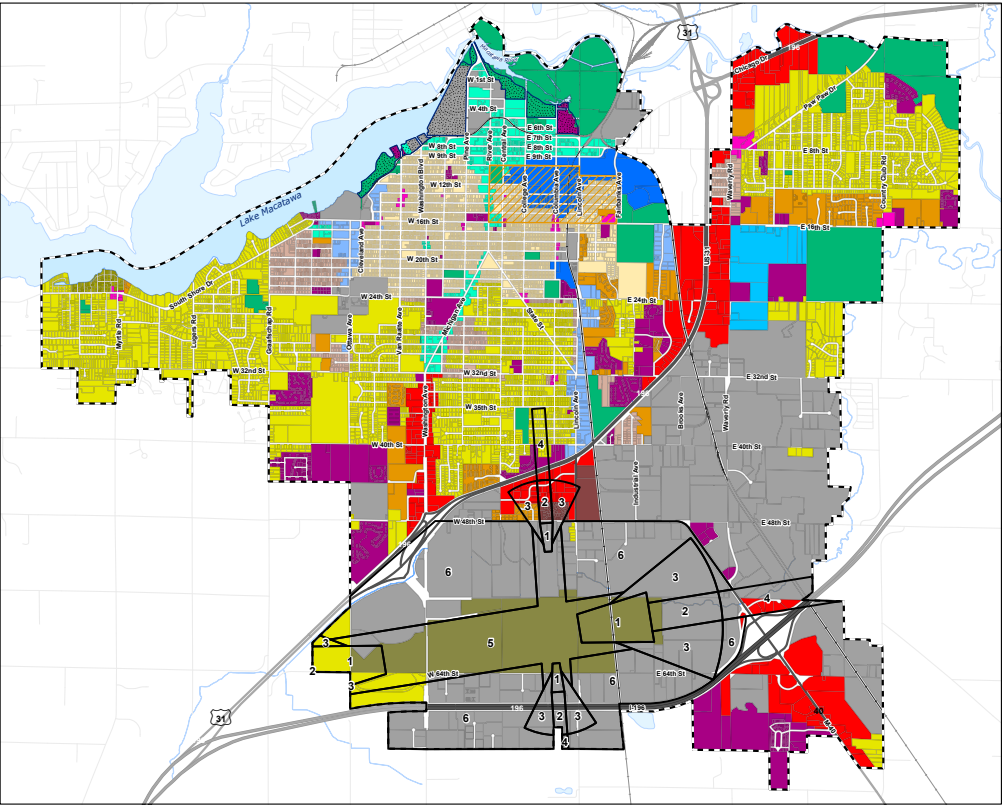
In Holland, the summers are warm and partly cloudy and the winters are freezing, snowy, windy, and mostly cloudy. Over the course of the year, the temperature typically varies from 20°F to 81°F and is rarely below 6°F or above 89°F.

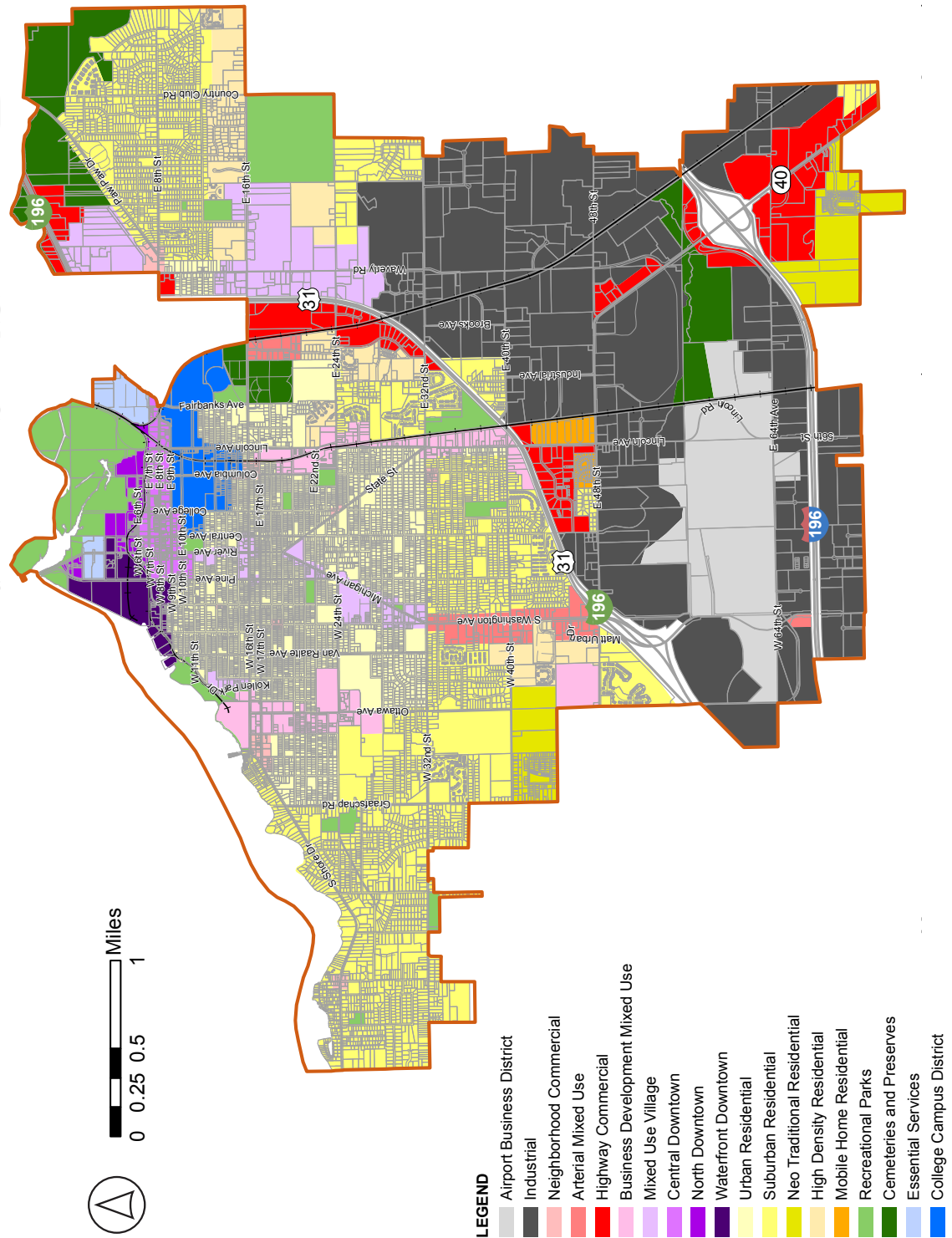

Map 5.2 Future Land Use



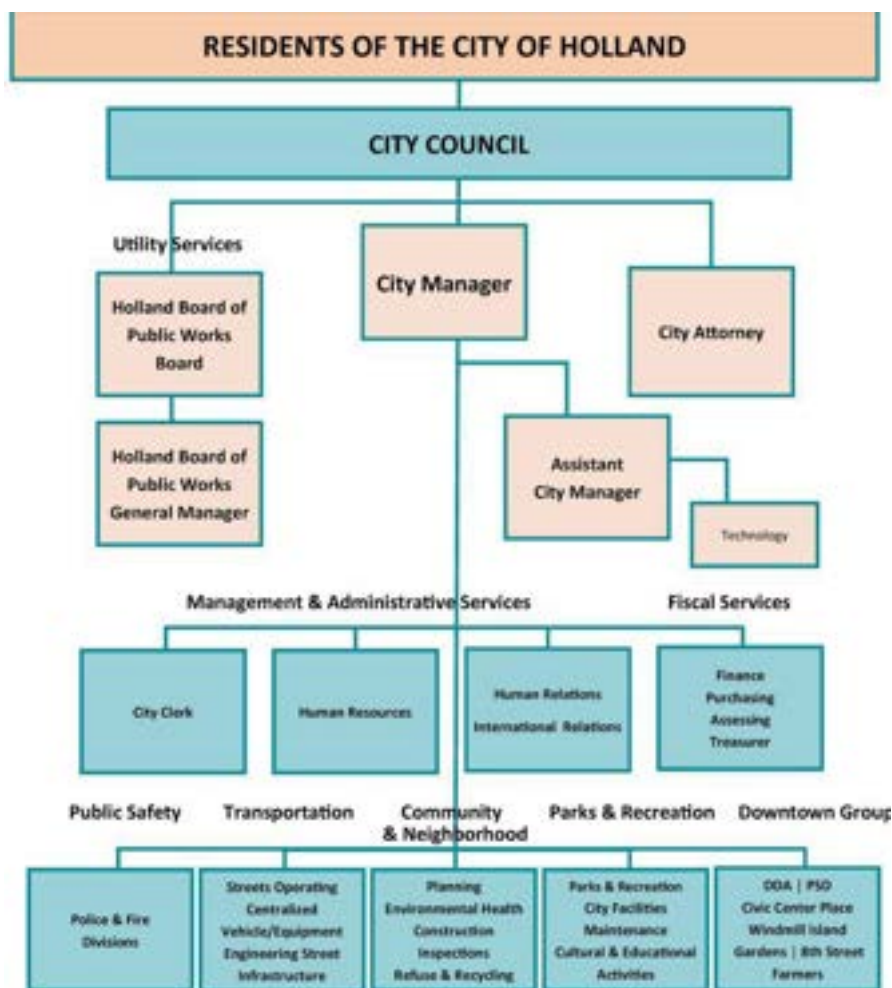




ADMINISTRATIVE STRUCTURE 3

Recreation planning is a method for anticipating and arranging recreational improvements so that they may be implemented on a reasonable schedule and without an adverse effect on a community's administrative and financial structure. An effective recreation plan will recognize the practical relationship between a community's administrative structure and its ability to follow through on a recommended recreational improvement program.

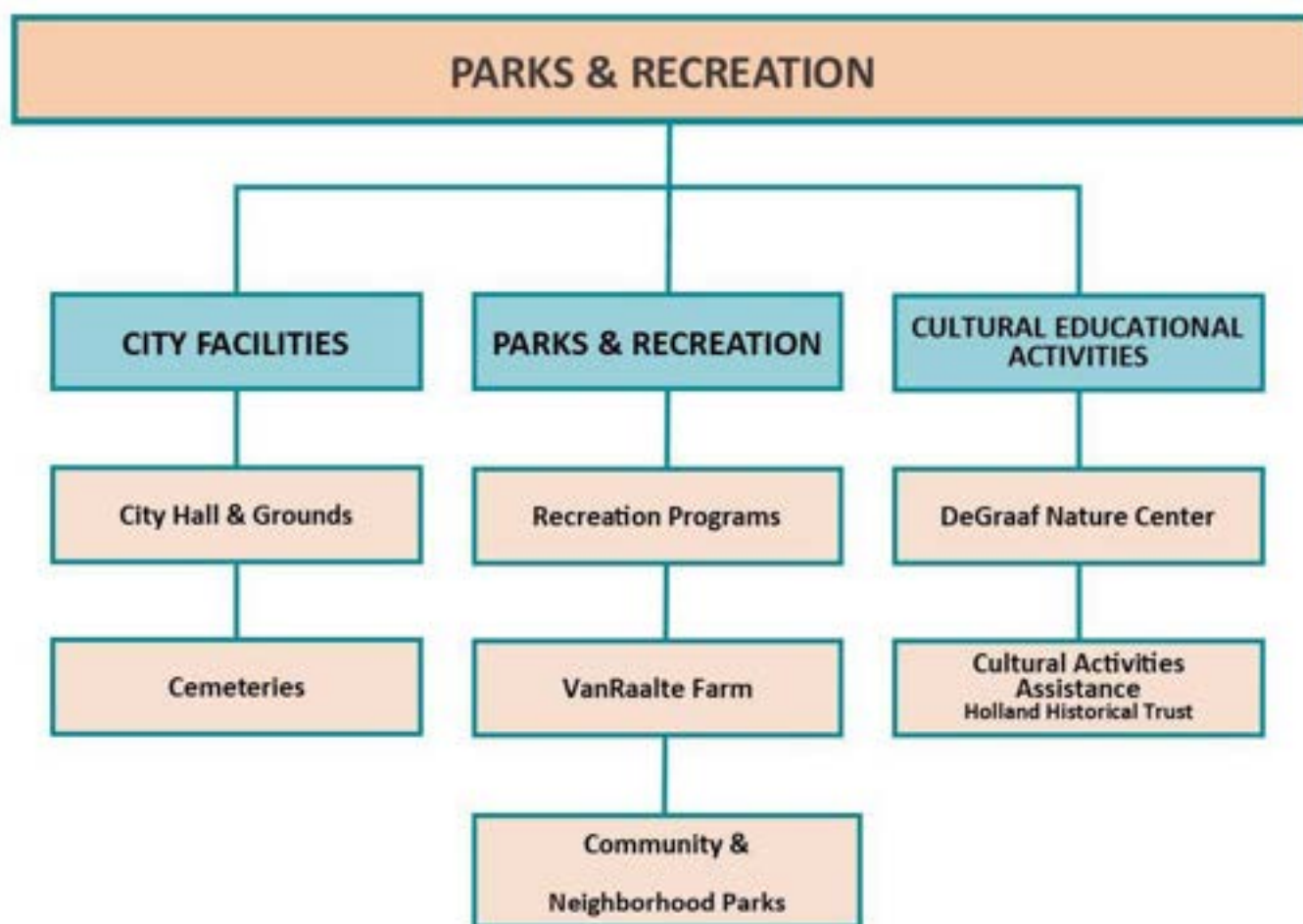
The City of Holland Organizational Chart is as follows:





PARKS DIVISION

The Parks & Recreation Group is responsible for the coordination and quality of all recreational and cultural opportunities for the city residents, and for the maintenance of all facilities. The overall objective is to provide safe, functional and beautiful facilities that can be utilized by all age groups. The Parks and Recreation Organizational Chart is as follows:





PARK EXPENDITURES

The City of Holland Parks Department is responsible for:

- Maintaining City parks, open areas, tot lots and streetscape landscaping
- Planting and maintaining tulip beds, lanes and boulevards
- Providing backdrop to annual Tulip Time Festival
- Trimming, planting, and removal of trees in the public park system and the public right-of-way

PARK AND RECREATION 2024 BUDGET

The FY-2024 Municipal Capital Projects, Ten Year Improvement Program budget for the City of Holland Parks and Recreation is \$2,355,000. (See full details in Appendices)

RECREATION PROGRAMS

Recreational Programming is under the direction of the Leisure and Cultural Services Director. Other full-time employees include a Youth Program Coordinator, a Secretary, two building custodians and two skilled recreation maintenance laborers. In addition to the full time staff, the Recreation Division employs numerous seasonal program supervisors, instructors, support staff, as well as many seasonal recreational maintenance staff. The overall City of Holland Recreation Division program includes a wide variety of youth and adult recreation activities as well as many other special events and leisure time activities. The Program Measurements report at the end of this section demonstrates the events, programs and participation numbers. Additional programs are run by the DeGraaf Nature Center, including a new kayaking program for area youth and adults.

In addition to the many programs that the Recreation Division offers directly, it also co-sponsors other programs with such organizations as The Holland Area Arts Council, Evergreen Commons Senior Citizen Center, Latin Americans United for



Progress, The Holland Area Boys and Girls Club, Holland Gem and Mineral Club, Holland Public Schools, the Holland Police Department and Holland Community Hospital.

RECREATIONAL TRENDS

The 10 most common park features in 2023 include: playgrounds (83.7% of park respondents have playgrounds); park shelters such as gazebos and picnic shelters (80.7%); park restroom structures (79.3%); outdoor sports courts for sports like basketball, tennis and, of course, pickleball (73.6%); walking and hiking trails (71.2%); bleachers and seating (70.4%); natural turf sports fields (69.6%); open spaces like gardens and natural areas (67.9%); concession areas (63.3%); and classrooms and meeting rooms (62.5%). Classrooms and meeting rooms rose into the top 10, switching places with community or multipurpose centers.

The most commonly planned program additions in 2023 for parks include: 1. Teen programming (up from No. 5) 2. Environmental education programs (no change) 3. Educational programs (up from No. 8) 4. Programs for active older adults (did not appear in the top 10 for parks in 2022) 5. Fitness programs (down from No. 1) 6. Arts and crafts (did not appear in 2022) 7. Group exercise programs (down from No. 4) 8. Adult sports teams (down from No. 7) 9. Mind-body balance programs such as yoga (down from No. 3) and 10. Special needs programs (down from No. 9)

ROLE OF VOLUNTEERS

Volunteers play the following roles in the Holland Parks and Recreation departments.

On the Park side, volunteers:

- Plant tulips
- Pick up litter/trash - Park cleanups
- Help to build playgrounds during community builds



- Set up the Cemeteries for Memorial Day activities
- Help with bigger projects that take lots of people - ex. is painting the railing at Kollen Park, there were 200 volunteers
- Serve on our Parks and Recreation Commission

On the Recreation side, volunteers:

- Coaches of all sorts - soccer, basketball, volleyball, etc.
- Help to run special events - Daddy Daughter Dance, Mother Son event, etc.
- Help at various programs



4 RECREATION INVENTORY

EXISTING RECREATION INVENTORY

In order to determine the recreational needs for the City of Holland, an analysis of the existing facilities was undertaken. The intent of the analysis is to provide a clear evaluation of the strengths and weaknesses of the existing recreational opportunities the City has to offer its citizens. The inventory is based on information provided by City staff and site inspections carried out by MCSA Group as part of the planning process.



TOWNSHIP PARK AND OPEN SPACE FACILITIES

The City park properties both fall under the classification of community parks. This classification is adapted from “Park, Recreation, Open Space and Greenway Guidelines,” J. D. Mertes and J. R. Hall, 1995, as recommended by the Michigan Department of Natural Resources. A more detailed description and photographic inventory of each site follows. An existing recreation facilities matrix provides a summary of the facilities provided at each location.



Accessibility

An accessibility assessment of each facility was undertaken using the following ranking system for the site elements based upon the 2010 Standards for Accessible Design:

1 - NONE

2 - SOME

3 - MOST

4 - ALL

5 - THE FACILITY MEETS THE PRINCIPALS OF UNIVERSAL DESIGN

Equitable Design, Flexibility in Use, Simple and Intuitive Use, Perceptible Information and Tolerance for Error, Low Physical Effort and Size and Space for Approach and Use

MINI-PARKS

Mini-parks serve a concentrated or limited population or specific group, such as families with very young children or senior citizens, as determined by the distance that can be easily traveled by the local user. The facilities that are provided in these types of parks are generally specialized, such as play equipment or green space with benches for passive activities. The area served by a mini-park is generally considered to be less than one quarter 1/4- mile radius in size. This will vary slightly depending on ease or difficulty of access and the character of the facility. Nationally accepted standards for mini-parks recommend 0.25 to 0.5 an acre with one (1) acre as a desirable size.

NEIGHBORHOOD PARKS

Neighborhood parks remain the basic unit of the park system and serve as the recreational and social focus of neighborhoods. This type of park typically serves a ¼- to ½-mile distance and is uninterrupted by nonresidential roads and other physical barriers. A size of 5-10 acres is considered optimal for this type of park.



NEIGHBORHOOD PARKS CONTINUED

The focus is on informal active and passive recreational activities, such as walking, field games, court games, playground equipment, and picnicking. The City has six neighborhood parks.

COMMUNITY PARKS

Community-wide parks serve a broader purpose than neighborhood parks and provide a range of facilities and areas capable of supporting structured and unstructured community participation. These areas are typically between 30 and 50 acres in size and serve two or more neighborhoods within a half to three-mile distance. Facilities may include wooded or natural areas, picnic shelters and grills, bike or hiking trails and other semi-active and passive uses for large groups of people. They may also contain specialized recreational facilities such as swimming pools, community centers and lighted ball diamonds. Community parks should be easily accessible from throughout their service area. Currently there are seven City parks classified within this category.

NATURAL RESOURCE AREAS

Natural resource areas are lands set aside for preservation of significant natural resources, landscapes, and open space. These sites are typically unsuitable for development but offer natural resource potential and can support recreational activities at a level that preserves the integrity of the natural resource. The location and size of these parks are largely governed by availability. There is one City park classified within this category.



SPECIAL USE FACILITIES

The Special Use classification covers a broad range of parks and recreation facilities oriented toward single-purpose use. Special uses generally fall into three categories:

- **Historic/Cultural/Social Sites:** Unique local resources offering historical, educational, and cultural opportunities. Examples include historic downtown areas, performing arts parks, arboretums, ornamental gardens, performing arts facilities, indoor theaters, churches, public buildings, and amphitheaters.
- **Recreation Facilities:** Specialized or single purpose facilities. Examples include community centers, senior centers, community theaters, hockey arenas, marinas, golf courses, and aquatic parks.
- **Outdoor Recreation Facilities:** Examples include tennis centers, softball complexes, sports stadiums.

Recreation needs, community interests, the type of facility, and land availability are the primary factors influencing location. Special use facilities should be viewed as strategically located community-wide facilities rather than as serving well-defined neighborhoods or areas. Where feasible, a geographically central site is optimal. The site should be easily accessible from arterial and collector streets, where feasible. Facility space requirements are the primary determinants of site size. As an example, a golf course may require 150 acres, whereas a community center with parking may fit on 10 or 15 acres. The City of Holland has four facilities that fit into this classification.



HALLACY PARK

Hallacy Park was dedicated in 2009 in honor of the former mayor of Holland, Mayor Louis Hallacy.

Amenities:

Seating area, planting beds.

Programming and Notes:

No formal programming. This park provides a small seating area across from Window on the Waterfront soccer fields directly adjacent to the north. Rail separates park from City Flats Hotel.

Accessibility Rating: 4

Accessibility Improvements:

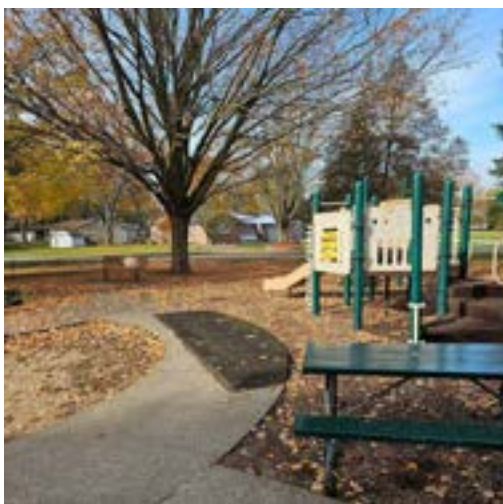

HOLLAND HEIGHTS PARK

Holland Heights Park was developed in 1993

Amenities:

Playground, picnic tables with shade structure, pickleball courts, walkways.

Programming and Notes:

No formal programming. Small, single-family residential on all sides. Large, well maintained church to northwest corner. Southern-most area of playground is missing equipment. Basketball courts were converted to pickleball courts.

Accessibility Rating: 2

Accessibility Improvements:

There are no accessible parking spaces. Play surface has settled and is no longer accessible. Equipment should be replaced with an accessible component structure.

Condition:

Park is adequately sized for its intended use and is in good condition. Some portions of the park in poor condition. Pickleball courts should be resurfaced.



MICHIGAN AVENUE PARK

Michigan Avenue Park was created by a triangular parcel set aside as park space when angular City avenues were constructed.

Amenities:

Benches, picnic tables, seating area, Wellness Trail stations.

Programming and Notes:

No formal programming. This landscaped triangular park provides pathways and seating opportunities close to the adjacent commercial area. Primarily commercial on all sides. Berms on west side buffer traffic and create a sense of enclosure and the relatively open views through the park create a pleasant visitor experience.

Accessibility Rating: 3

Accessibility Improvements:

Circular plaza area in need of maintenance (weeding, brick alignment) to maintain full accessibility.

Condition:

Park is adequately sized for its intended use and is in good condition. Brick seating area requires minor renovations and regular maintenance.



WASHINGTON SCHOOL GREEN

Washington school green was developed as a joint project between the City and the Washington School neighborhood. The majority of the funds needed to develop the park were raised by the neighbors. The playground was built by the community.

Amenities:

Play equipment, wellness stop, benches, drinking fountain with bottle filler, picnic tables, bike racks. Native planting beds with crushed stone path and natural stone seating.

Programming and Notes:

No formal programming. This neighborhood is part of Holland's Historic District. Residential to west, north, and east. Now-closed Washington School Building to south is currently for sale, potential mixed-use.

Accessibility Rating: 5

Accessibility Improvements:

None at this time

Condition:

Park is adequately sized for its intended use and is in good condition.



WATER TOWER PARK

Water Tower Park recently became part of City's Wellness Trail. The water tower was located on site of current playground.

Amenities:

Playground, benches, Wellness Trail stations.

Programming and Notes:

No formal programming. Small, single family residential to west, commercial to east. Park appears to be popular with families with toddlers in the immediate vicinity.

Accessibility Rating: 3

Accessibility Improvements:

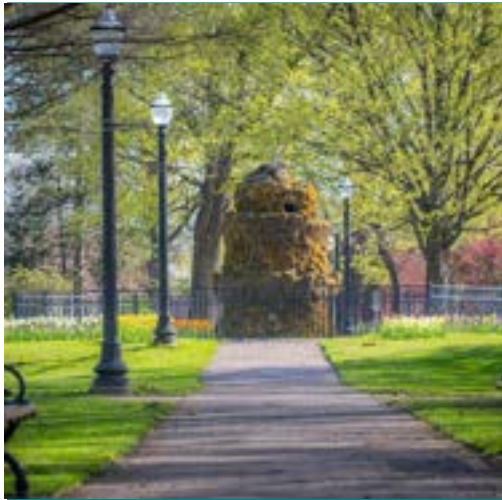
Additional accessible playground elements recommended to maintain full accessibility.

Park is adequately sized for its intended use and is in good condition. Brick seating area requires minor renovations and regular maintenance.



CENTENNIAL PARK



NEIGHBORHOOD PARK

Centennial Park was originally set aside as a market space, dedicated as a park to celebrate the centennial of American in 1876. It was once the site of a jail. The rock fountain was donated in 1902.

Amenities:

Gazebo above restroom building, Veterans Memorial, Wizard of Oz living floral mosaic, historic marker, tulip beds, fountain, reflecting pool, statue of Van Raalte, performance venue.

Programming and Notes:

Weddings are held in the central gazebo. Art in the Park. Festival activities. Single family residential to the south. Retail/commercial/civic/church use on remaining three sides.

Accessibility Rating: 3

Accessibility Improvements:

Improvements recommended for the gazebo, which is not currently accessible by ramp. Continuous maintenance on the brick paving will keep the walks accessible.

Condition:

Park is adequately sized for its intended use and is in good condition.

Holland Heights School Park was developed as part of a joint project between the City and Holland Heights School in 2001 and dedicated on May 30, 2003.

Amenities:

Play structure, picnic tables with shade structure, two modified soccer fields, two tennis courts, parking, walkways, basketball courts on adjacent school property.

Programming and Notes:

Youth soccer and T-ball. The East/west sidewalk that runs north of soccer field forms the boundary between City and school park. Single family residential on all sides. Neighborhood sidewalks connect to park with crosswalks.

The park is adequately sized for its intended use, is well maintained and in excellent condition.

No formal programming. There is a view of water from Bay Avenue. Surrounded on four sides by single family residential. The neighborhood has many mature trees and woodland areas. The park is well maintained and has a number of very large silver maples.

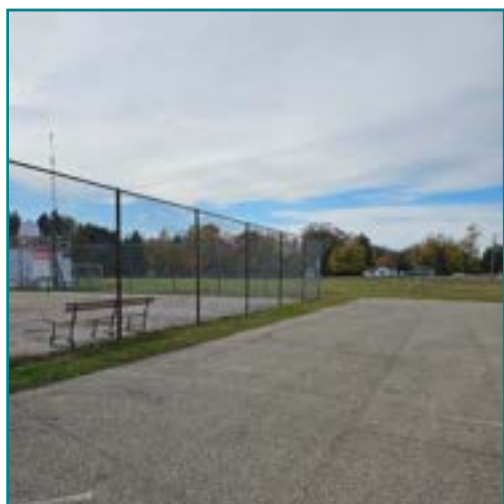

Improvements are planned for the fields.

Restroom building, picnic shelter, playgrounds, volleyball court, basketball courts, pickleball courts, tennis courts, open lawn area and Wellness Trail stations.

Programming and Notes:

Summer tennis lessons, pickleball events and leagues, Holland Christian Middle School and Black River Schools use all tennis courts. Single family residential on all sides, active neighborhood with sidewalk/crosswalk connections. Evergreen Commons Senior Center is less than 1/4 mile to the east.

The park is adequately sized for its intended use. With the recent upgrades, the park is well maintained and in excellent condition.

Rosa Parks Green Park was originally called 19th Street Field. There was a baseball field at this facility in the 1940's. Holland Independence, a team in the Federal League, played at this field. Several Holland Independence players played under assumed names in the Grand Rapids Class "D" State League, because they played on Sundays, which at that time was against the Holland establishment. Several players were recruited to the White Sox's farm team. "Lefty" Van Werien, who lived in East Saugatuck, was recruited to the Cubs farm team.

Amenities:

Play structures, group picnic shelter, loop walking path, two half-court basketball courts, lawn area, gaga ball pit, soccer field.

Programming and Notes:

Youth Soccer League. Summer lunch program. Dense, single family residential on all sides.

Accessibility Rating: 3

Accessibility Improvements:

Some of the walkways have settled and should be replaced as necessary.

Condition:

The park is adequately sized for its intended use.



PROSPECT PARK



NEIGHBORHOOD PARK

Prospect Park was purchased on May 31, 1901 by eight concerned Holland citizens, calling themselves Holland Improvement Co. from Mr. Hermanus Laarman for a sum of \$1,830 in order to protect the last of the original forest in or near Holland and donated the property to the City of Holland. The Holland Improvement Co. held the deed to the property until July 16, 1907, at which time it was sold to the City of Holland for \$1.00.

Amenities:

Wooded area, picnic tables, walking paths, play area, dense stand of mature trees representing many species.

Programming and Notes:

No formal programming. School uses park for tree studies. Park is heavily wooded, surrounded on three sides by single family residential. 'Baker Lofts' multi-family residential to the east.

Accessibility Rating: 3

Accessibility Improvements:

Accessibility improvements to the play structures is recommended.

Condition:

The park is adequately sized for its intended use.

Van Bragt Park was used as tulip bed for Tulip Time Festival since 1934.

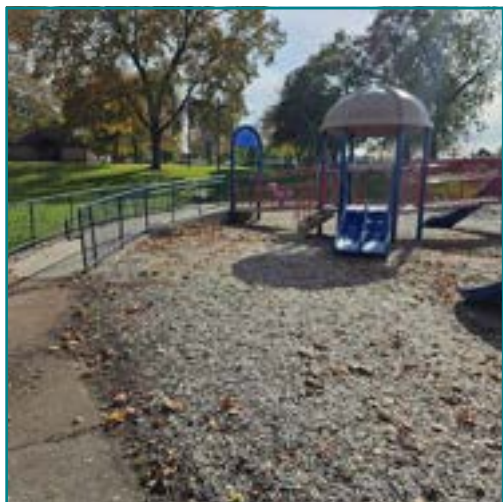

Programming and Notes:

Location for City events including 4th of July fireworks, Tulip Time events, WOTV Celebrity for Family programming around West Michigan, National Night Out, Movies in the Park. Concerts are held in the band shell. Boat access in summer. Maranda Park Party held here for over twenty five years. One of city's most popular parks. Well maintained, newer amenities. This park is an important link to the trail system linking Lake Michigan to downtown, Window on the Waterfront, and beyond. Kayak launch is in the current Capital Improvement Plan.



KOLLEN PARK/HEINZ WATERFRONT WALKWAY

Accessibility Rating: 4

Accessibility Improvements:

Accessibility improvements to the boardwalk are recommended.

Condition:

Park is adequately sized for a community park, but because it is a waterfront park and contains a linear element in the boardwalk, expansion toward the north and east would be beneficial in serving the community. Programming and Notes:

Soccer, baseball, Little League, fast-pitch high school softball league, basketball. Summer lunch program. Single family residential on all sides, some sidewalks. Skinned in-field across College Avenue belongs to the school and is maintained by the City for Little League.



MAPLEWOOD YOUTH COMPLEX

Accessibility Rating: 3

Accessibility Improvements:

New accessible playgrounds, ongoing maintenance to paved and chips and fines walks.

Condition:

Park functions as a neighborhood park for a portion of the year and is adequately sized for this use. Residential to north and east. Northern fields remain wet after a rain. Has a reputation as one of the nicest facilities in the region.

Historic Van Raalte Farm, dog park, DeGraaf Nature Center Sugar Shack, marked nature trails, picnic shelter, play structures, winter sledding, groomed cross country ski trails, parking, orienteering course.

Programming and Notes:

Student field trips, special events held here, such as Halloween celebration. Allows dogs on leash. Cross-country ski trails. Each fall the park plays host to a three-day Civil War reenactment, called the Van Raalte Farm Civil War Muster. Rural neighborhoods to east and south. Residential and retail/commercial to north and west.

Accessibility Rating: 2

Accessibility Improvements:

Accessibility improvements recommended including barrier-free toilets, along with replacement of the southern play structure.

Condition:

Park is adequately sized for its intended use and is in good condition.

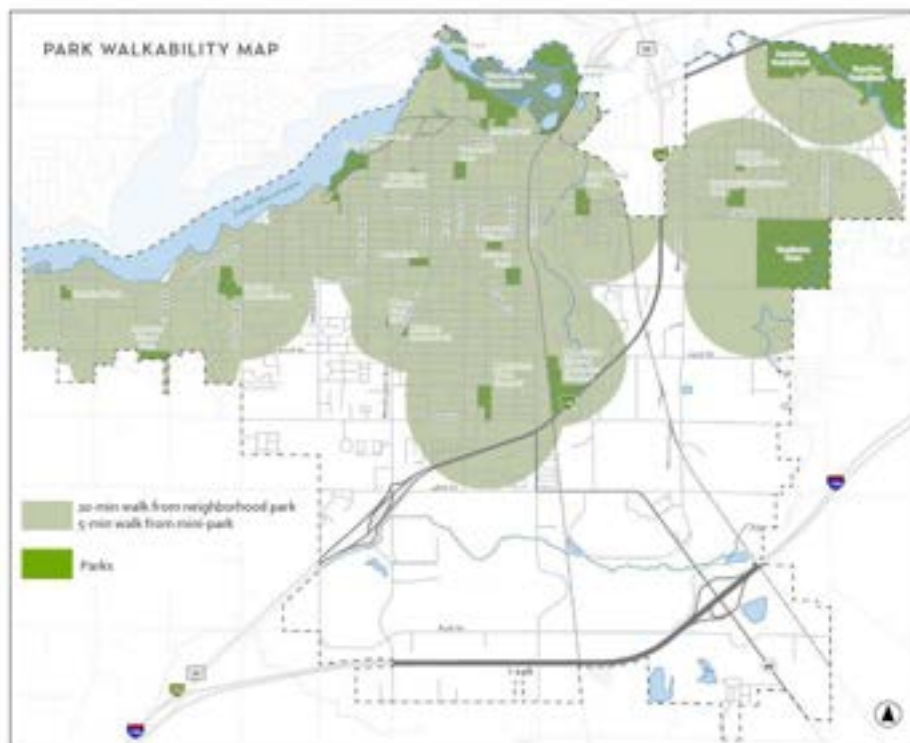

OTHER RECREATION PROVIDERS

There are a number of quasi-public, private and commercial facilities that play a significant role in Holland’s recreational potential. These facilities are listed below:

Holland Aquatic Center Swimming Pool Authority: Run by non-profit foundation, opened in 1999. Its 86,000+ square feet occupies two city blocks in central Holland, and offers a competition pool, leisure pool with slides and play area, therapy pool, instructional pools, and fitness center.

Holland Energy Park: Holland Board of Public Works flagship plant, completed in 2017. Grounds feature paved walking trails that will be integrated into the Macatawa Greenway system.

Evergreen Commons (Private): A Senior Center located on a 2-acre site south of the intersection of State Street and Michigan Avenue.

Golf Courses:

Clearbrook Golf Club (Public): 18 holes, 6494 Clearbrook Drive, Saugatuck

Crestview Golf Club (Public): 18 holes, 6279 96th Avenue, Zeeland

Links at Rolling Meadows (Private): 9 holes, 1259 Saint Andrews Drive, Holland

Macatawa Legends Golf Course and Country Club (Private): 18 holes, Holland

The Ravines Golf Club (Public): 18 holes, 3520 Palmer Drive, Saugatuck

Winding Creek Golf Course (Public): 27 holes, 4514 E. Ottagon Street, Holland

Marinas:

There are several privately owned marinas in the Holland area. It is estimated that nearly 1,000 slips exist on Lake Macatawa alone. Some of these docks or slips are expensive to own or lease and all should not be considered as accessible to the



general public. A partial list of the marinas in the area includes: Anchorage Marina: Ottawa Beach Road, Park Township; Eldean Shipyard: South Shore Drive, Park Township.

Equestrian Opportunities:

Two horseback riding stables with rental options are available in adjacent Park Township, and one is available in Holland Charter Township. There are currently no public equestrian trails in the City of Holland. In Ottawa County, equestrian trails are available at Pigeon Creek Park (3 miles), Eastmanville Farm (4.5 miles) and the Musketawa Trail (10 miles).

COUNTY AND REGIONAL FACILITIES

There are a number of county and regional facilities and public lands that meet the special recreational needs of the City of Holland. The primary recreational activities of these parks is often camping, swimming, hiking, and picnicking. The following activities are within a ten mile radius:

Cottonwood Township Park (Allegan County) includes restrooms, gazebo with a large grill and table, children's play area and trails of crushed stone.

Kirk Park (Ottawa County) is located on Lake Michigan in Grand Haven Township. This 68 acre park consists of shoreline dunes, mature deciduous forest, pine plantations, and varying topography. Facilities include 1,350 feet of beach, picnic areas with grills, playground equipment, lodge, restrooms and parking for 310 vehicles.

Tunnel Park (Ottawa County) is located on Lake Michigan in Park Township. This 22 acre park features a unique tunnel through the dunes, dune climb, parking, playgrounds, beach and picnic areas.

Pigeon Creek Park (Ottawa County) is located in Olive Township, north of the City of Holland. This 282 acre park consists of inland dunes, mature deciduous forest, pine plantations, and a portion of Pigeon Creek. The facilities include several miles of hiking and cross-country skiing trails, a small sledding hill, picnic area, group camping area, boardwalks, and lodge building with restrooms, concessions, and ski rentals.



Hemlock Crossing/Pine Bend (Ottawa County) is 239 acres of woods and wetlands along the Pigeon River in Port Sheldon Township just west of US 31. Facilities include two small picnic shelters, a kayak/canoe launch, over a mile of paved trail and over 6 miles of trails for hiking and cross country skiing. A pedestrian bridge and numerous overlooks offer scenic views of the river corridor, wetlands, natural springs and woods. Pine Bend is a secondary access on the west end of the property that offers parking and a trailhead. Future plans include the development of a Nature Center at this site.

The Upper Macatawa Conservation Area (Ottawa County) located in Zeeland Township, includes 576 acres along the Macatawa River. The site offers passive recreation opportunities while recognizing the value of the site for water quality improvement, flood water storage and wildlife habitat enhancement. Recent improvements include parking areas on 84th and 76th Avenues as well as the development of footbridges, picnic areas and overlooks. Trails for hiking and cross-country skiing, including a section of paved trail that will be part of the future Macatawa Greenway trail system is also complete.

Mt. Pisgah (Ottawa County) is a large parabolic dune that offers a panoramic view of Lake Michigan, Lake Macatawa and surrounding woods. A wood stairway provides access to the top of the dune, which features viewing platforms and connections to Holland State Park trails.

Adams Street Landing (Ottawa County) is a ten-acre site with mature trees and 1200 feet of frontage on the Macatawa River. Visitors will enjoy fishing, picnicking as well as a launch site for canoes and kayaks.

Hawthorn Pond Natural Area (Ottawa County and Holland Charter Township) is a 40-acre park offering a walking trail around the 5-acre Hawthorn Pond with a kayak launch ramp. There are lookout stations at various locations around the pond as well as on the Macatawa River. Hawthorn Pond Natural Area is jointly owned by Holland Charter Township and Ottawa County.



Historic Ottawa Beach Parks (Ottawa County) includes 80 acres of land in Holland, Michigan, located between the north shore of Black Lake (now Lake Macatawa) and Lake Michigan. In May 1886, Ottawa County Surveyor Albert Peck platted the resort with 150 cottage lots, streets, and a lot for a hotel. He designated the majority of the land as park area owned in common by cottagers, with each residential lots abutting one of the parks. The Hotel Ottawa, built immediately by the Chicago and West Michigan Railroad (later the Pere Marquette Railway), was one of the largest resort hotels on the eastern shore of Lake Michigan. Some guests arrived by train, many more by steamship from Chicago. The hotel burned in 1923.

Riley Trails (Ottawa County) is 300 acres of rolling terrain, beech-maple forest, pine plantations, and an informal trail system located in Park Township. The property has long been enjoyed by hikers, cross country skiers, mountain bikers and other outdoor enthusiasts. Although county-owned, Park Township has provided assistance over the years in maintaining the site for public use. In 2006, the County Board of Commissioners transitioned the property to Ottawa County Parks.

Holland State Park (State of MI) is located in the far southwest corner of Ottawa County in Park Township. This facility covers 142 acres and provides two large campgrounds, picnic areas with grills, playgrounds, fishing, beach with beach house, and parking. Holland State Park has one of the highest visitor attendance of all the state parks in Michigan.

Saugatuck Dunes State Park (State of MI) contains 909 acres north of Saugatuck, on Lake Michigan. Facilities include parking, picnic areas, beach and trails.

Laketown Township Beach Park (Laketown Township) is a 2.7 acre park, located at the western end of 142nd Street, has 200 feet of Lake Michigan frontage and is used for swimming and other beach related activities. A large sand dune separates the parking area and the beach.



RECREATION GRANT INVENTORY

The City of Holland has been fortunate to receive a total of thirteen 13 grants through the Michigan Department of Natural Resources over the las 53 years.

An itemized Recreation Grant History can be found in the Appendices.





5 PLANNING AND PUBLIC INPUT PROCESS

RECREATION PLANNING

Recreation planning plays an important role in maintaining the quality of life in a community. If a community is to provide effective recreational opportunities, it needs a way of identifying and solving current problems and anticipating future needs. Recreation planning is one means of obtaining a perspective on these problems; developing realistic alternatives; formulating goals, policies, and recommendations for public and private decisions; developing criteria to measure change; and involving people in the planning, design and decision processes.

This Parks and Recreation plan presents an evaluation of the City's recreational needs and opportunities. It considers the existing amenities in the City, the current and anticipated demand for additional or improved facilities, and the means for providing those facilities.

This plan is to serve as a guideline for directing the City in the operation and maintenance of existing and future facilities and programs to meet the recreational needs of its citizen's. The plan summarizes long-term recommendations intended to guide the development of recreation opportunities and describes an action and capital improvement program for implementation over the next five years.



PLAN PROCESS AND DEVELOPMENT

This 2024 Community Parks and Trails Plan was developed by the City, with the assistance of MCSA Group, Inc, a park and recreation planning consultant. Staff met regularly with representatives of MCSA Group, between October 2023 and January 2024 for the development of this plan.

Criteria considered and evaluated for plan development evolved from the examination of goals and recreation standards determined through a wide variety of input sources. This information was collected from the inventory and review of existing facilities; the identification of recreation needs and deficiencies; public opinion; current statewide recreation issues and priorities; and future expectations.

Public input was sought throughout a survey held to solicit public desires and concerns regarding parks and recreation. The survey was advertised via email, the City website and social media. The survey was available on the internet via Survey Monkey. A total of 597 surveys were completed. The survey was well received and indicated a high level of satisfaction with the City's Parks and Recreation system. Comments from the survey were incorporated into a final draft of the Plan. The public input schedule was as follows.

PLAN PROCESS AND DEVELOPMENT CONTINUED

The survey found that over 83% of the recreation programs in the City are meeting the residents needs. The most utilized parks facilities are Kollen, over 80% of respondents have utilized in the past 12 months, Centennial with 71% utilization by respondents, and Moran Parks with 59%. Respondents noted that the condition of the parks, facilities and amenities if their highest priority. Overall maintenance of the City parks was rated as good on a scale of excellent to poor. Over 51% of respondents stated that their highest priority for future implementation was to develop a centralized indoor recreation facility.

A summary of all the answers and comments can be found in the appendices of this report.





RECREATION NEEDS AND DEFICIENCIES 6

This section of the plan identifies recreation deficiencies determined through a variety of means. Study methods include comparison to recreational standards for acreage and facilities, geographic distribution of existing facilities, direct input from the City of Holland staff and representatives, and public input and participation. While each of these methods has its limitations, using a combination of methods will yield a more accurate assessment of recreational needs and deficiencies. The following is a brief description of each of the methods used.

RECREATION STANDARDS

While only a guide, recreation standards provide a benchmark for evaluating the relative adequacy or inadequacy of the City's recreation system. This plan has used as a guide the 1983 Recreation, Park, and Open Space, Standards and Guidelines and 1995 Park, Recreation, Open Space and Greenway Guidelines published by the National Recreation and Park Association.

Typical recreation standards establish a certain number of activity-specific recreational facilities per 1,000 of population (e.g. 1 tennis court per 2,000 persons). Other standards establish a certain number of acres per 1,000 of population for different types of park facilities, such as neighborhood, community and regional parks. These standards are adapted to reflect the City's character and compared with the existing and projected population. This plan will combine both approaches to ascertain deficiencies in recreational facilities and acreage. The U.S. Census Bureau population estimate was used for the purposes of this study.

There are two basic types of recreational experiences: "active" and "passive."



“Active” recreation requires space and facilities capable of accommodating exertive activities. Such facilities include: sports fields, play apparatus areas, open areas, special facilities, such as pools and court areas, and areas for organized activities. On the other hand, “passive” recreation requires little more than space and furniture for quiet, non-exertive activities for limited numbers of users. Recreation areas must provide for both types of use and preferably include a variety of opportunities for each to respond adequately to a wide range of interests and age groups.

Parks are generally classified by purpose and area per population served. They range in type from mini-playlots and green areas to large regional and national parks.



RECREATION STANDARDS FOR ACREAGE

MINI PARKS

Description

Mini-parks serve a concentrated or limited population or specific group, such as families with very young children or senior citizens, as determined by the distance that can be easily traveled by the local user. The facilities that are provided in these types of parks are generally specialized, such as play equipment or green space with benches for passive activities.



Service Areas

The area served by a mini-park is generally considered to be less than one quarter (1/4) mile radius in size. This will vary slightly depending on ease or difficulty of access and the character of the facility.

Mini Park Acreage Standards

Nationally accepted standards for mini-parks recommend 0.25 to 0.5 an acre per 1,000 of population with one (1) acre as a desirable size.

Existing Mini Recreation Acreage

The City of Holland currently has six (6) parks that fall into this category. Refer to the Recreation Inventory for specific park names and sizes. As many of the functions of mini-parks are also served by neighborhood parks these should be looked at together rather than individually.

NEIGHBORHOOD PARKS

Description

Neighborhood parks serve individual neighborhood populations as determined by the distance that can easily be traveled by local users for relatively short periods of recreation. Facilities provided in these parks are generally active in nature and include multipurpose open play areas for pick-up games, play apparatus, court areas, landscaping, site furnishings and possibly a shelter. Special areas for bike riding or specific court games may also be provided. Activities for all seasons should also be included.



Service Areas

The area served by neighborhood parks is generally considered to be a one quarter (1/4) mile to one half (1/2) mile radius in size and should be uninterrupted by non-residential roads or other physical barriers.

Neighborhood Park Acreage Standards

Nationally accepted standards for neighborhood parks recommend one or two (1-2) acres per 1,000 of population with five (5) acres as a minimum size and five to ten (5-10) acres optimal. It is recommended that the minimum of two (2) acres per 1,000 population be used as a guide for site selection.

Existing Neighborhood Recreation Acreage

The City of Holland currently has eight (8) neighborhood parks. Refer to the Recreation Inventory for specific park names and sizes. For analysis purposes, mini-parks and neighborhood park land shall be combined, as they serve a similar purpose. The City of Holland currently has 48.8 acres of mini and neighborhood parkland on a total of 14 sites

Needs and Deficiencies:

The table below compares the 2020 City population to the recreation standard of two (2) acres per 1,000 persons.

For the 2020 population, there is deficiency of 19.92 acres for mini and neighborhood recreation in accordance with the recreational standards.

The use of the acreage standard must be coupled with a review of the location and accessibility of the existing recreation areas. Additionally, the recreational acreage should be accessible on foot without having to cross busy streets or negotiate physical barriers.





COMMUNITY PARKS

Description

Community-wide parks provide a range of facilities and areas capable of supporting organized community participation programs that would not be appropriate in neighborhood parks because of their average size or traffic volume generated. Facilities should be Centrally located, diverse enough to accommodate all age groups for both active and passive experiences and organized so that compatible uses relate to one another. Adequate parking and vehicular circulation is also important, since park users will generally arrive at these parks by vehicle. Lighted use areas significantly increase the recreational value of parks of this type. Typical facilities recommended for community parks include ball fields, open use areas, tennis courts, picnic areas, play apparatus areas, restrooms and shelters. Additional special facilities could include band shells, amphitheaters, swimming and wading pools, community-meeting buildings, skating facilities, bicycle courses and nature study areas.

As with neighborhood parks, it is often beneficial to develop community parks in conjunction with junior or senior high schools where practical because of the athletic fields and courts potentially available for public use. This arrangement assures the maximum level of use as well as the most practical expenditure of development funds.





COMMUNITY PARKS CONTINUED

Service Area

The area served by community-wide parks varies significantly from one municipality to another because of the distribution of population and related factors. However, a community park usually serves two or more neighborhoods in a half to three-mile radius.

Community Park Acreage Standards

The size of a community park varies according to the desired uses but is usually between 30 and 50 acres. It is recommended that a range of five (5) to eight (8) acres per 1,000 population be used as a standard basis for development.

Existing Community Recreation Acreage

The City of Holland has 6 facilities which would fall within the Community Park classification.

Needs and Deficiencies:

The following table compares the 2020 City of Holland population to the recreation standard of eight (8) acres per 1,000 persons.

For the 2020 population, there is deficiency of 3.55 acres for community recreation in accordance with the recreational standards.

NATURAL RESOURCE AREAS/OPEN SPACE

Description

Natural resource areas are lands set aside for preservation of significant natural resources, remnant landscapes, open space and visual/aesthetic buffering. These sites are typically unsuitable for development but offer natural resource potential and can support recreational activities at a level that preserves the integrity of the natural resource. The location and size of these parks are largely governed by availability.

Existing Natural Resource Area Acreage

The City has one City Park, Degraaf Nature Center that has an acreage of 18.0.

Needs and Deficiencies

There are no recognized acreage standards for natural resource areas and the Township is fortunate to have a significant amount of natural resource acreage within the Leroy Township limits.

SPECIAL USE FACILITIES

Description

The Special Use classification covers a broad range of parks and recreation facilities oriented toward single-purpose use. Special uses generally fall into three categories:

- **Historic/Cultural/Social Sites:** Unique local resources offering historical, educational, and cultural opportunities. Examples include historic downtown areas, performing arts parks, arboretums, ornamental gardens, performing arts facilities, indoor theaters, churches, public buildings, and amphitheaters.
- **Recreation Facilities:** Specialized or single purpose facilities. Examples include community centers, senior centers, community theaters, hockey arenas, marinas, golf courses, and aquatic parks.
- **Outdoor Recreation Facilities:** Examples include tennis centers, softball complexes, sports stadiums.



SPECIAL USE FACILITIES CONTINUED

Existing Special Use Facility Area Acreage

The City of Holland has 2 facilities which would fall within the Special Use Facility classification.

Service Area

Recreation needs, community interests, the type of facility, and land availability are the primary factors influencing location. Special use facilities should be viewed as strategically located community-wide facilities rather than as serving well-defined neighborhoods or areas. Where feasible, a geographically central site is optimal. The site should be easily accessible from arterial and collector streets, where feasible.

Special Used Facility Acreage Standards

Facility space requirements are the primary determinants of site size. As an example, a golf course may require 150 acres, whereas a community center with parking may fit on 10 or 15 acres.

LINEAR PARKS AND PATHWAYS

Description

There are a number of different types of trails that can provide both transportation and recreation opportunities. Trails may be located within parks, on an independent right-of-way, or within the road right-of-way. Connector Trails are defined as “multi-purpose trails that emphasize safe travel for pedestrians to and from parks and around the Community” (J.D. Mertes and J.R. Hall, Park, Recreation, Open Space and Greenway Guidelines, 1995). These trails are generally located within the road right-of-way and can be divided into two types. Type I has separate paths for different user types, such as pedestrians and bicyclists. Type II has mixed uses and is suited to lighter use patterns, site size. As an example, a golf course may require 150 acres, whereas a community center with parking may fit on 10 or 15 acres.



LINEAR PARKS AND PATHWAYS CONTINUED

Existing Facilities

Off-road linear trails are currently provided by the Heinz Waterfront Walkway and Kollen Park boardwalk and Window-on-the-Waterfront. Van Raalte Farm also has an extensive trail system, although this is restricted to pedestrian and cross-county skiing use. Paw Paw Park also has a natural trail system.

The City of Holland has extensive walking/bicycle paths located on City Streets. These pathways link to neighboring communities and regional trails.

Needs and Deficiencies

Linear parks and trail development was identified as a priority during the planning process, particularly along the waterfront. Future consideration should be given to providing off-road bike paths or non-motorized trails primarily for bike and pedestrian use, which link residential areas to school/ park developments and to City and neighboring community recreation facilities.





RECREATION STANDARDS FOR ACTIVITIES/FACILITIES

The existing and future recreation needs of the City of Holland were examined in comparison to state and national standards for key activities. The following table compares the recommended number of facilities per population for the City of Holland (currently 34,368) with the existing facilities available and illustrates any current or projected deficiencies.

The table on the following page compares the recommended number of facilities per population for the City with the existing facilities available and illustrates any current or projected deficiencies.

While standards for comparison address the quantity of facilities desirable for a particular number of persons, they do not address quality or location concerns. Consequently, any community that has the appropriate numbers of facilities may not have facilities of a useful or desirable quality or may not have facilities located where they would be most accessible to residents.

RECREATION FACILITIES SUMMARY

The City of Holland takes pride in its parks and recreation facilities and demonstrates good stewardship of its natural resources. While substantial improvements have been achieved over the last 10 years, there is a definitive need for more parks with active recreation.



GOALS AND OBJECTIVES 7

The City of Holland has developed the following goals and objectives for park and recreation facilities and programs. These Goals and Objectives are based upon input from citizens, elected and appointed City officials, and City staff. The goals are long-range in nature and intended to be broad in scope and flexible enough to accommodate future change. The objectives are intended to direct specific program and development decisions to be made within the next five years. Both the goals and objectives are intended to guide actions but be flexible enough to reflect changing attitudes and opportunities as they may present themselves. Time and attitude changes can have an impact on specific options, and it is essential for the City of Holland to be responsive to its citizens.

The goals and objectives for the City in meeting the recreation needs of residents are outlined below.



GOAL 1:

Borrow from the traits of the community of creativity and efficiency to improve and extend resources.

Objectives:

- Develop partnerships to maximize the use of recreational facilities within the city.
- Evaluate areas where facilities are underutilized, or programs are not well attended.



- Develop partnerships with groups who could provide services that make park facilities more attractive to users.
- Maximize staff/ schedules.
- Continue conversation with potential partners to share resources such as Park Township, Laketown Township, Holland Charter Township and the City of Zeeland.
- Accommodate current trends without disproportionate spending on single-use facilities.
- Adaptive reuse of existing facilities to accommodate new or re-surgings uses.

GOAL 2:

Preserve and promote the historical and cultural heritage of the city.

Objectives:

- Work toward the completion of the historical restoration plan for all historical parks.
- Work to encourage and develop other historical/tourist facilities in the city.
- Provide Interpretive opportunities at parks discussing the history and heritage of the City of Holland
- Include industrial history where applicable
- Provide venues for cultural programming, such as performance space at Kollen Park.

GOAL 3:

Practice and promote good stewardship of park lands.

Objectives:

- Maintain parks and facilities to high standards.
- Continue to rehabilitate and/or redesign many of the city parks.
- Repair any damage or graffiti done immediately.
- Develop a marketing strategy that will better educate community residents on the effects of vandalism and improper use of city facilities.
- Install deterrent systems such as digital cameras



- Make it easier for users to participate in maintenance/stewardship of public spaces.
- Provide clearly marked landfill/recycle receptacles in all parks and facilities that are located conveniently for grounds staff to empty and for visitor use.
- Install receptacles that are of consistent color/style/quality and with standard labels for waste.

GOAL : 4

Provide accessible, enriching recreational opportunities and experiences for all people.

Objectives:

- Plan and develop park areas to offer passive as well as active opportunities.
- Diversify the types of facilities offered.
- Rehabilitate and improve existing park sites to meet and exceed all safety and accessibility regulations.
- Ensure a variety of facilities to provide opportunities for all residents, regardless of race, income, and ability.
- Provide equal access to sports programming for low-income families and individuals who live beyond walking distance to parks.





- Partner with elementary schools to expose students to a variety of athletic and recreation opportunities, including sports like soccer, lacrosse, tennis, competitive swimming, and golf.
- Expand drop-in recreation such as basketball, futsal, etc.
- Advertise low-cost or free activities as well as any scholarship opportunities.
- Provide key information and signage in multiple languages.

GOAL : 5

Provide a safe environment for parks users.

Objectives:

- Work with neighborhood associations to evaluate the perceived level of safety in the parks. Community Police Officers will be involved in the programming whenever possible.
- Strive to make each city park visibly and physically inviting.
- Encourage neighborhoods to adopt a park or participate in adopt a park.
- Rehabilitate and improve existing park sites to meet and exceed all safety and accessibility regulations.

GOAL : 6

Provide facilities, trails, and programming opportunities available year-round, both indoor and outdoor.

Objectives:

- Identify opportunities for winter-time recreation
- Identify cross-country ski/snow-shoe trails to maintain and possibly to expand.
- Maintain a plowed parking lot at identified parks throughout winter months for ice fishing access.



GOAL : 7

Provide linkages between Holland's neighborhoods, its parks, and the waterfront. Maximize the use of Hollands waterfront for recreational purposes.

Objectives:

- Identify existing parcels where land use is blocking waterfront access and limiting pedestrian connections, determine land swap opportunities, land acquisition, or rights of way to maintain continuity.
- Assess property acquisition opportunities for continuous waterfront trail from Kollen to Windmill Island.
- Continue to seek public/private partnerships to both develop public lands and to provide additional support facilities and activities on the city's waterfront properties.
- Improve public access to Lake Macatawa
- Embrace the National Park Service National Water Trail Best Management Practice (BMP) criteria by promoting, establishing, and improving recreational opportunities that encourage use of the local and Great Lakes Region water trails.







ACTION PROGRAM & 8 CAPITAL IMPROVEMENT SCHEDULE

ACTION PROGRAM

The Action Program and Capital Improvement Schedule for the City of Holland Park and Recreation Plan states the proposed course of development or improvement that will be taken over the next five years. The Goals and Objectives, from the previous section, serve as guidelines for the development of the Action Program. The Capital Improvement Schedule which follows will focus on the needs identified in the Action Program and will project potential expenditures for the five-year action period on a year-by-year basis. The five-year period will begin in 2024 and extend through 2028. This time period will not be sufficient to accomplish all of the goals and objectives but begins to prioritize those projects that may be achievable within the initial five years.

The Action Program focuses on reduction of deficiencies and expansion and improvements of facilities in a manner that not only meets current needs, but also diversifies the type and quality of recreational opportunities within the City. The Community Park and Recreation Plan identifies these needs in general terms in the Recreation Needs and Deficiencies section, the Action Plan describes specific actions to be taken to address these needs, and the Capital Improvement Schedule specifically itemizes those projects which will be most feasible during the next five years. The proposed schedule will allow for flexibility as funds become available and as opportunities are presented.

The following actions are comprehensive and may require more than five years to complete.



The following projects have been identified for improvements and will occur as funds allow.

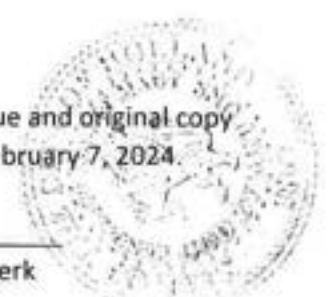

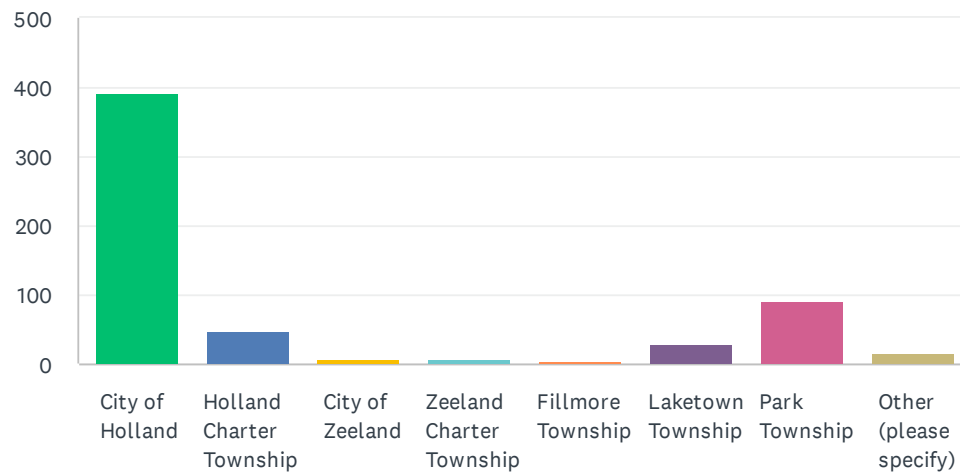

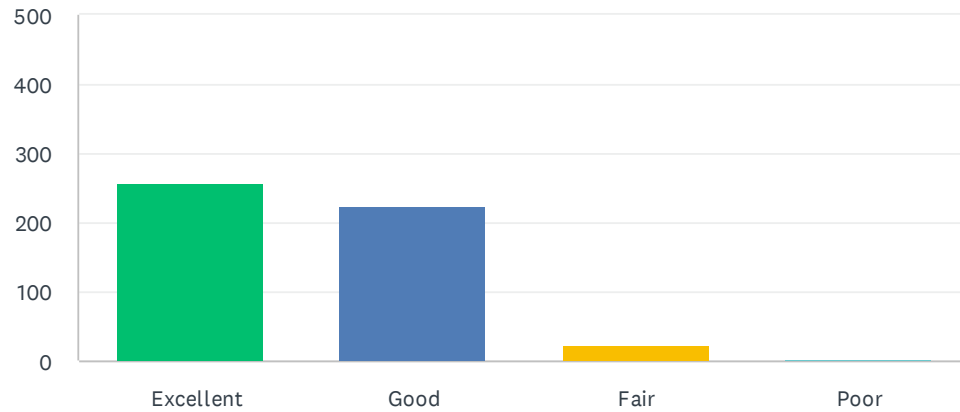

Q2 If you are you a resident of the City of Holland, how would you rate your overall quality of life living in Holland, Michigan?

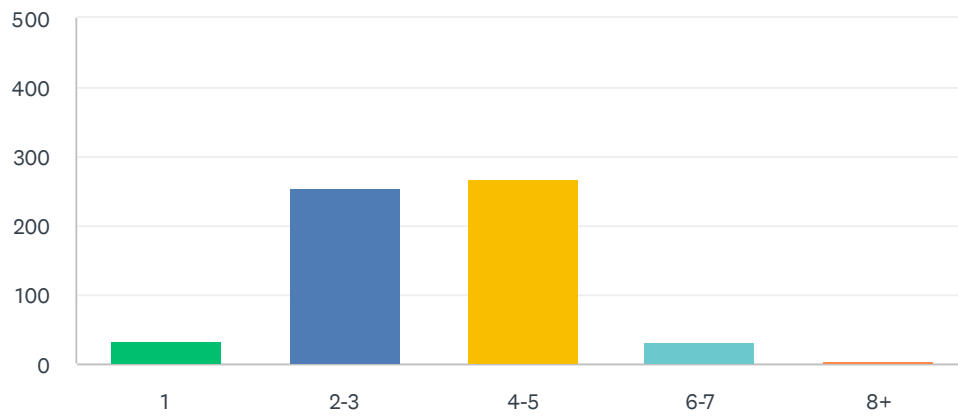

Q3 How many people currently live in your household?

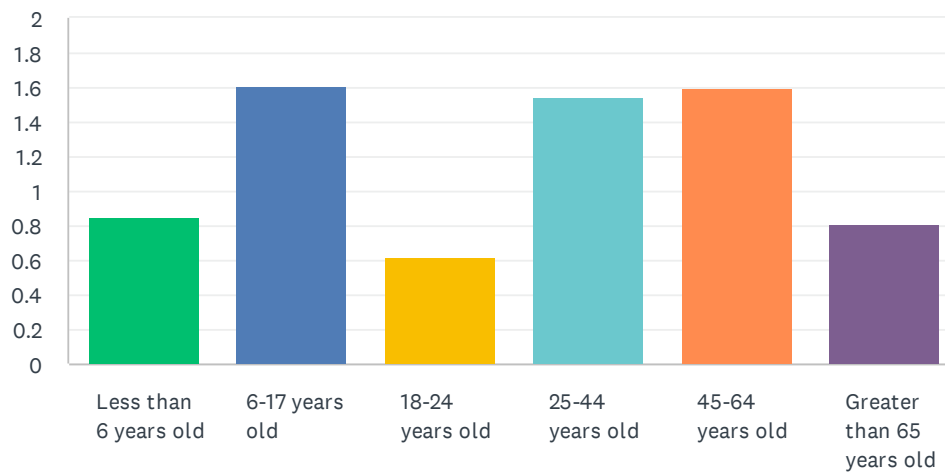

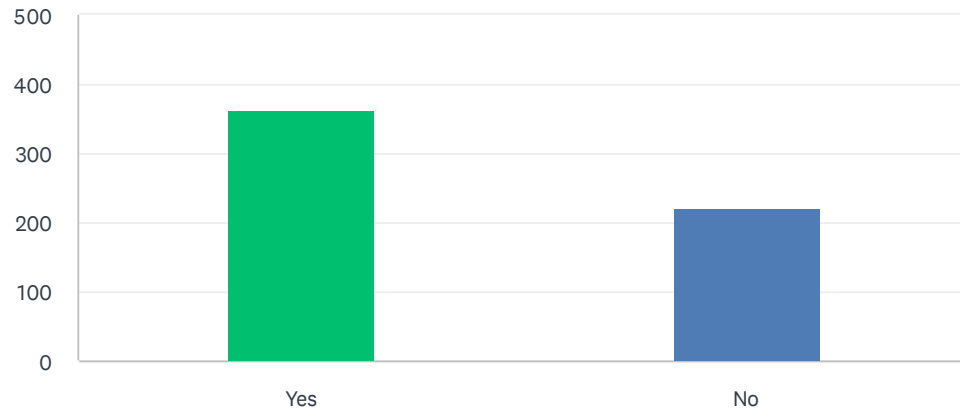

Q5 Have you or members of your household participated in recreation programs offered by the City of Holland in the last 12 months?

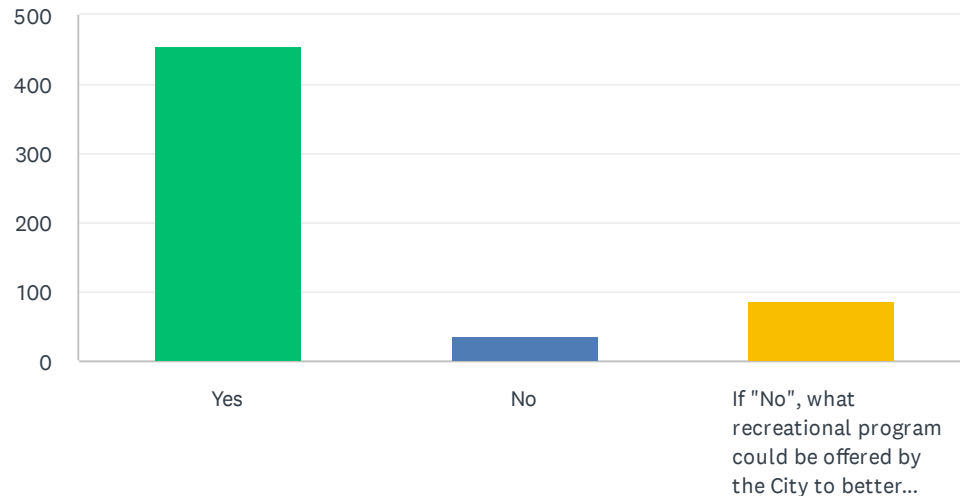

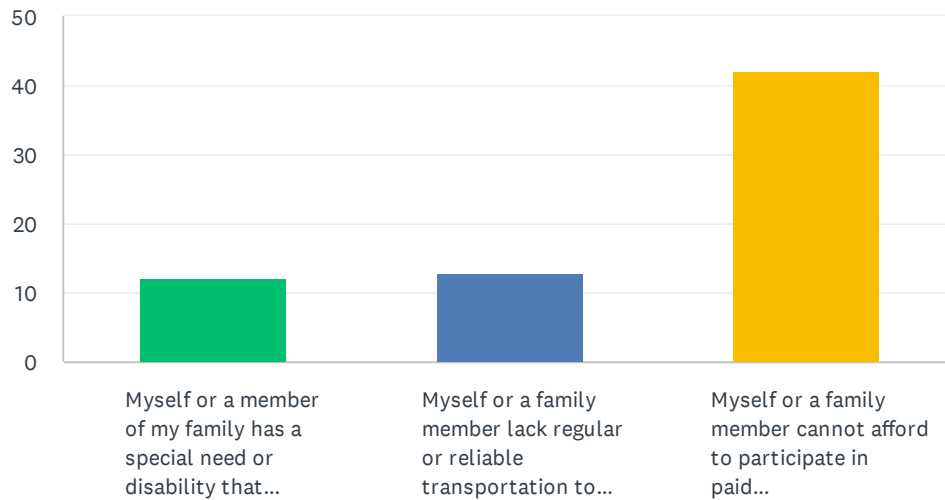

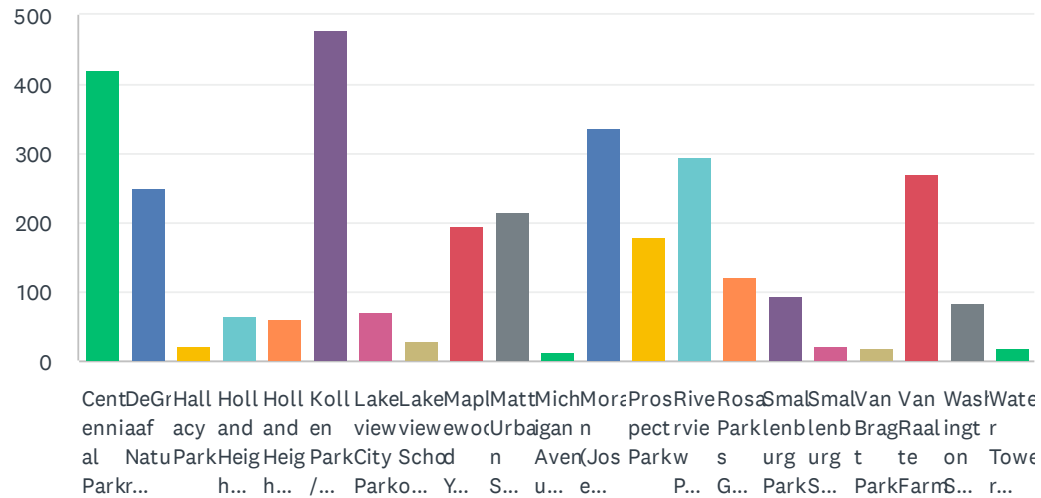

Q9 Which of the City's park facilities have you or members of your household utilized in the last 12 months?

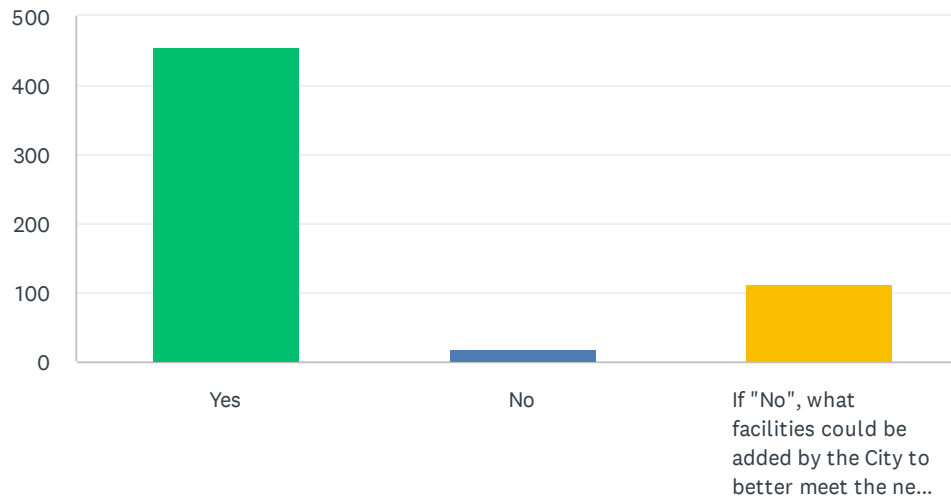

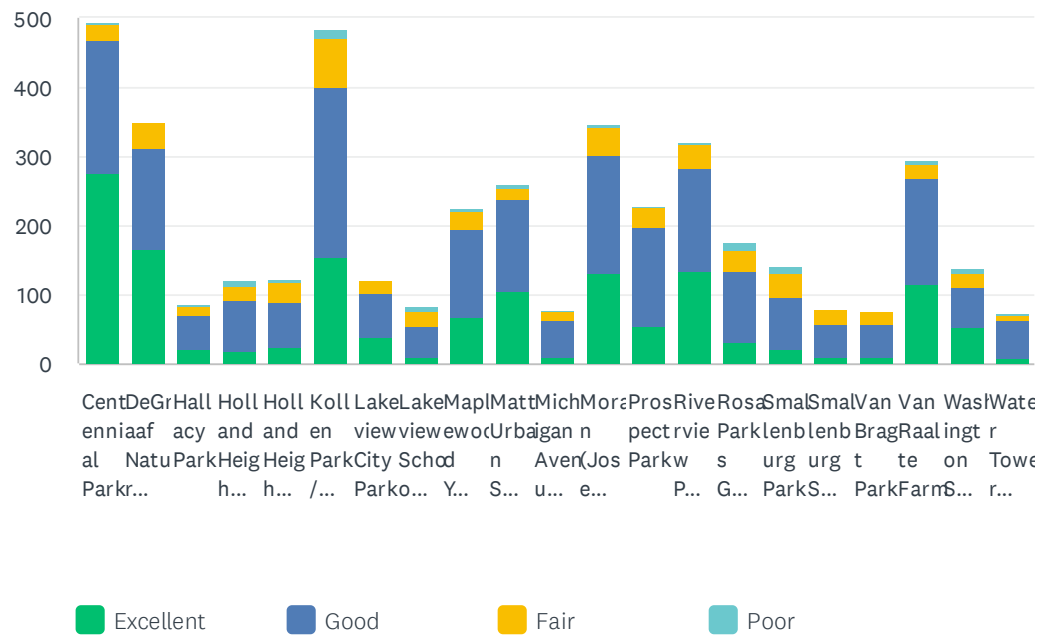

Q13 How would you rate the maintenance of City Parks you have visited?

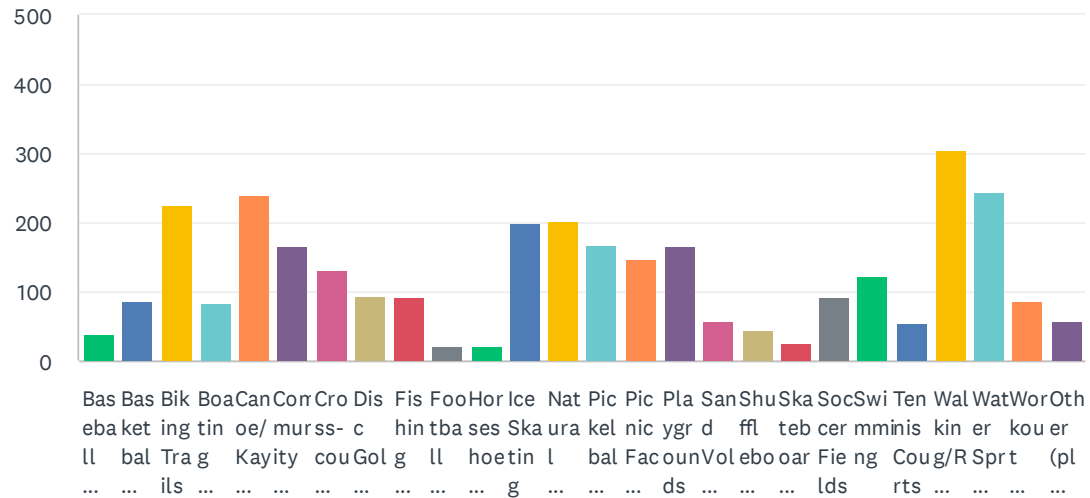

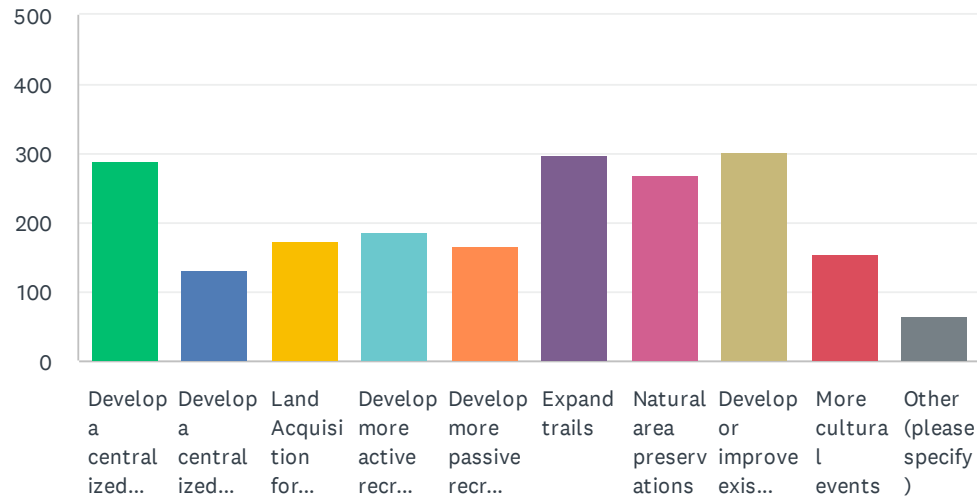
